

Teachers' Assistance Sheet

Props to use to reinforce Vocabulary: The printable Vocabulary Visual sheet for Chapter 14 is a picture of a stone table. While showing it to your students and making the obvious connections to the book, you could also talk about the various ways that stone tables have been used in the past and are currently used in our day. Also included is a printable of the White Witch's army. It would be a good time to talk about whether the students would want to align with such characters as the White Witch associated with.

While you don't want to teach your students to exclude people because they don't like them or other inappropriate reasons, it is also good to show them that there are times that it is not in their best interest to spend time with people that are not healthy for them and how to do that in ways that are healthy and not mean or inappropriate. Snack: Bread Stick Ropes The obvious connection here is to the ropes used to tie Aslan. And although we suggested bread for the Chapter 13 as well, this will be significantly different bread, and I assure you, students will not mind!



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You can use homemade or store bought dough. Before baking, twist the sticks to make them look like ropes (see picture on the Chapter 14 snack idea sheet). Bake according to directions. When the breadsticks are done, baste them with melted butter and sprinkle with garlic salt. (Then try not to eat a bunch of them before taking them to school!)

Game: Sneaking Away From the Witch's Army This game is actually the famous children's game, Red Light, Green Light, except that it is given the theme of the Witch's army. Feel free to have some way students can identify the person that is "it" as a member of the Witch's army—it can be a mask or costume of any kind. It's even better if you can find these things around your house or classroom.

Craft: Stone Table This supplies for this craft are easily obtained at your local dollar store with the exception of the stone textured paint. I got a can of spray paint at Lowe's but honestly, it was more than I really wanted to pay. A more affordable alternative is to get some gray paint with black sand. Mix the sand into it until you have a good balance when testing by painting it on scrap paper.

By using floral foam cubes, it will be easy to cut it into 1-inch thick slices for the table top. Then it is easy to cut that foam into a broken table. Cutting it gave a more dramatic effect than just breaking it by hand.

Once you have that done, it is super easy to stick the "table legs" into the correct parts of the pieces of foam. Once the table is complete, you can glue the pieces onto card stock so that it looks like the table

collapsed and fell there. I also included a quote to have students glue onto their card stock, completing the craft. Just print it up on card stock and cut as many as you need for each student.
